DOLLAR FOR MISSIONS contributions are now being devoted to necessary infrastructure at University Lutheran Church in Champaign (UniLu). New toilets will be installed in a men's room, and a new water heater installed for the building.

"Items like these seem far from glamorous," said CID Mission Executive Ken Schurb. "They do not capture our senses until problems arise in connection with them. Then their importance stands out." He added that plumbing as well as painting and many other such "background" elements help UniLu offer Christ in Word and Sacrament to University of Illinois students, faculty, and staff.

On October 24, CID President Michael Mohr declared complete the previous DFM project, which had been furnace replacements at Immanuel Lutheran Student Center in Macomb. This project ended up requiring only about half of the \$25,000 originally set aside for it.

The Macomb furnace project was the last on the list approved by CID Board of Directors for this year. Under discretionary authority within guidelines that this board adopted for DFM, Pres. Mohr opened the current project to address known needs at UniLu.

For the third consecutive year, CID mission stations have been assembling a list of their projected repair and upgrades for the next 10 years. "The list makes it easy to look up needs at CID mission properties," Pres. Mohr said. District congregations will see the total updated list prior to next summer's CID convention. **Amount to be funded:\$5,000. Project:** Replace toilets in basement men's restroom and replace water heater at University Lutheran Church, Champaign

All Saints' Day (observed) November 3, 2024

Text: Revelation 7:9-17 (First Reading)

Other Texts: 1 John 3:1-3 (Epistle); Matthew 5:1-12 (Gospel)

"The Glorious Hope of Heaven"

Grace, mercy and peace be yours from God our Father through faith in the Lord Jesus

Christ.

As far back as my memories go, I've always known and believed that heaven is the place that true believers in Christ go when they die. And I have no doubt that you too know and believe this incredible hope that is *heaven*. So on this All Saints' Day as we remember those dear Christians who departed in faith, let us take some time to consider, yes, *heaven*.

To begin, let us recognize that Scripture refers to three distinct things with the word heaven: the sky/atmosphere, outer space, and the dwelling place of God, which is what we most commonly associate with the word. Perhaps this threefold use is why the Bible often speaks of the *heavens*, plural. St. Paul helps here when he writes that he was taken up to the third heaven, which he also refers to as *paradise*. So biblically, we correctly speak of the sky/atmosphere as the first heaven, outer space as the second heaven, and the dwelling of God, paradise, as the third heaven, which is what Jesus refers to when He assures the repentant robber, "Today you will be with me in *paradise*." For He certainly wasn't referring to a reunion around Jupiter!

A second biblical distinction to keep in mind is heaven *before* Judgment Day and heaven *after* Judgment Day. To connect to our previous point, this heaven *before* Judgment Day *is* the third heaven, the paradise Paul was caught up into, to which Jesus promised to the robber who had a "death bed conversion," and is what believers who have died *are currently experiencing* since all these are before our Lord returns in glory to Judge the living and the dead.

What can we confidently say about heaven *before* Judgment Day? Logically, we must quickly say something about what directly precedes entering heaven: bodily death. While recognizing that there are indicators that medical professionals use to determine if someone is alive or dead, these are only *indirect* measurements. For death is not merely the irreversible cessation of heartbeat or brain functions, *but is the separation of the soul from the body* which, of course, will cause those indicators that doctors rightly use. So what happens to the soul?

First, we must say that the concept of "soul sleep" is a false teaching. Based upon God's Word, the church father Tertullian wisely said, "Sleeping is an act of the body, not the soul." Thus when the Bible refers to death as "sleep" or "falling asleep," it is a reference

to the body which we "lay to rest" in the grave as it awaits being awakened. The soul, however, is not asleep but, having been judged, instantly begins the torments of hell if an unbeliever or, if a believer, experiencing heaven *before* Judgment Day, "*Today* you will be with me in paradise."

So what can a soul experience without a body? Honestly, with this we are in a realm of mystery where the light of our reason cannot reach and so our imagination will too easily corrupt. As in all cases of divine mysteries, here too we must let the Word alone guide us, being thankful for everything God does reveal to us even as we dare not depart from it in speculation, whether in pride of our thinking or feelings, or in ingratitude over His not revealing more.

So again, what can be said about what a believer's bodiless soul experiences in heaven? First, their sinful nature is finally gone, so the battle against the old Adam is finally over. That alone is a great blessing indeed! But more, let's hear what St. Paul has written, "We would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord," and again, "For to me to live is Christ, and to die is gain," and again, "My desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better." In Jesus' parable, the angels took poor Lazarus to Abraham's side where he was *comforted*, his suffering over to never be experienced again. And just consider the word used for heaven before Judgment Day, *paradise*, which obviously indicates peace and joy being the "new normal."

As to how much these blessed souls are aware of, we can say very little. It is true that John hears the souls of the martyrs crying out in heaven, "O Sovereign Lord, holy and true, how long before you will judge and avenge our blood on those who dwell on the earth?" However, those words do not actually indicate that they are aware of what's happening on earth, but are more of a cry of vindication. At most, it seems that they may recognize some level of the passing of time at least to the extent of knowing that Judgment Day has not yet come. But beyond that, we must be silent and instead of hoping that our dead loved ones are looking over us, be thankful instead that the One who looked over them and saved them is also looking over us, Christ Jesus!

Finally, while not often considered, perhaps the greatest comfort concerning those in heaven is that *they can never lose salvation*, as sin and Satan can no longer touch them. Being in heaven *before* Judgment Day means that you *will be* in heaven *after* Judgment Day. And to that we now turn our attention.

When our Lord returns on the Last Day, all the dead will have their bodies raised, "some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt." It is believers in Christ Jesus who will rise to everlasting life. It is of their bodies that it is written, "It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body." For only believers have the promise that Jesus "will transform our lowly body to be like his glorious body." And believers alone have the promise that the Lord will create a world for them that is fully capable of bringing all the blessings that He promises to them.

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying, "Behold, the dwelling place of God is with man. He will dwell with them, and they will be his people, and God himself will be with them as their God. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes, and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away."

Truly, when the Bible speaks about the joys and glories of heaven that await us, it is primarily the new creation of which it speaks. For consider Jesus' words which we regularly use at a Christian funeral, "If I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." It is when Jesus *comes again* on the Last Day that He will take us into the fullness of the place prepared for us, the place that is truly heaven since God Himself comes down and dwells visibly among us, no longer hidden behind means, for our purified, sinless, glorified resurrected eyes will be able to see Him in His glory, as the one who sees him no longer will die, but will instead enjoy the fullness of life in the Holy Spirit.

After the greatest blessing of seeing God and being in His full presence, heaven after Judgment Day will be enjoying the plethora of God's continual, unfolding blessings that we will experience with both a soul and body that will be able to receive them in their fullest. All evils gone, all effects of evil gone, only that which is good forevermore. And we will not be alone, but as we bask in God's presence we will also enjoy the presence of the angelic beings and that great multitude that no one could count of which St. John was given a "sneak peak." Here is the great reunion with our believing loved ones for which we long; the opportunity to see them, hear them, speak to them, touch them with our resurrected eyes, ears, tongues, and hands.

Whatever the specifics may be, we will finally be home in our Heavenly Father's house along with all our brothers and sisters in the faith from Adam and Eve to the last of the elect on earth. And best of all, we never have to leave this home, the feast at its table never ends, no goodbyes will need to be said anymore. Only newfound experiences and joys as we serve God as holy priests, fully loving one another as we were created to, even as we experience the fullness of love and community that God always intended, of which marriage, family, and church here on earth are but hints. Blessed hints, absolutely; yet only but hints of what is to come.

Today, All Saints' Day, is one especially filled with comfort and hope for you regarding your loved ones who died in the faith, and for when you face death yourself. It is comfort and hope because the Lamb of God has opened heaven for you by His life, death, and resurrection in your place. You wash your robes white in the Lamb's blood as you live the new life of faith given in your Baptism, repenting of your sins, confessing them, and

receiving forgiveness as you hear and believe His Gospel that comes to you in the Word, Absolution, and Holy Communion.

Faith is easy, for we trust in Christ who did it all. Being faithful is anything but easy. We are called to purify ourselves: the pain of rooting out sin, growing in righteousness, and suffering for such at the hands of the devil and the world. But have no doubt, it is worth the pain, the mocking, the bearing of the cross, even dying, for we follow our Savior who suffered all that for us, being increasingly conformed to His likeness, which then helps us in our battle against sin and our enemies, and assures us we are on the path of everlasting life of heaven before, and especially after, Judgment Day, something so incredible that St. Paul says, "For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us." And not only does the Word assure us that it is worth the tribulation we endure, it even promises God will bring us through them, that no one will be able to snatch us out of the nail-scarred hands of our Shepherd Jesus nor His Father.

Dear saints, run the marathon, fight the good fight, travel the hard path, strive to enter through the narrow gate. Do this through repentance and faith, being tested by suffering and proven genuine by a holy life. Do this confident that heaven, the home of the Triune God, both before and after Judgment Day, is *your* home. There you will be vindicated against your enemies, rest from your pains, labors, and fights, and receive the victor's crown. All because of Jesus, crucified and risen, whose name we praise now on earth, and forever in heaven. Amen!
